In a win for freedom of the press, the Supreme Court rules that The New York Times can continue printing the Pentagon Papers. President Nixon issued an order last month to stop the release of the information, but the Court said that newspapers can publish the documents.

Last night at Washington, D.C.'s Watergate complex, five men were caught breaking into the office of the Democratic National Committee. The reason for the break-in is unclear. President Nixon, currently running for a second term, denies any involvement.

WATERGATE BURGLAR RECEIVED CAMPAIGN MONEY

A scandal is taking shape as The Washington Post reports that one of the Watergate burglars had \$25,000 deposited into their bank account traced back to an account for President Nixon's re-election campaign. Nixon's campaign manager continues to deny any involvement in the break-in of the Democratic headquarters.

John Dean, currently serving as President Nixon's White House counsel, has testified before the Senate Judiciary Committee that he spoke to Nixon about the Watergate break-in and cover-up at least 35 times.

NIXON RESIGNS, FORD TO TAKE OFFICE TODAY

Richard Nixon, the 37th president of the United States, is the first in the nation's history to leave his post. Nixon won his second term by an overwhelming margin but says he must resign for the good of the country. This announcement comes just after the House Judiciary Committee approved three articles of impeachment. Had the president not resigned, the House of Representatives planned to vote soon to determine whether or not he would be impeached.
